



# HEAD MASTER'S INTRODUCTION

It has been a great pleasure, through our Spring Term, to see the outstanding work of our students and staff in a remarkably broad range of areas. Our school is thriving and it is a delight to see so many pupils working hard, trying out new activities, developing new skills and making the most of their opportunities.

The term has, however, inevitably been affected by the very sad news of the death of Dr Andrew Grist, our inspirational and much-loved Chemistry teacher. Dr Grist was a tremendous colleague and a very important figure to thousands of students, who benefited from his teaching since he joined us in 2007. His death was a great shock to us all and our thoughts and prayers are with his family. We look ahead to a celebration of Dr Grist's life in April when we return from the Easter holidays.

As ever, it has been a busy and exciting term for the creative and performing arts at King's High. It is exciting to see our chamber music programme developing so quickly and we were thrilled to learn that our U12 chamber group, Accordia, were crowned national Pro Corda champions at a concert in London recently. Our Jazz, Rock and



Pop Evening was simply outstanding with a fantastic range of solo and group performances in the Bridge House Theatre. Our annual Dance Show, involving students from Warwick Prep and King's High, showcased incredible talent as students performed ballet, hip hop and contemporary routines to a delighted audience in Warwick Hall, whilst the Middle School Production of Sam Holcroft's 'The Wardrobe' was another highlight of the term, with striking and original performances from King's High and Warwick School students.

In sport, some rather mixed weather has failed to dampen the spirits of our teams. Our U15 waterpolo team qualified for the national finals next term, whilst our U16 rugby team is developing very nicely with an impressive showing at the Northampton Saints 7s tournament. Our U14 football team are on a strong cup run, looking forward to a big semi-final next term, whilst our U13 netball team were crowned county champions and our U14 netballers became ISA regional champions. Our U12 netball team made it through to two major national semi-finals; our U18 tennis team were crowned regional champions at the LTA Midlands' Championships; and our U14 netball team played brilliantly to come runners up in the national ISA finals at Nottingham University.

The Spring Term always has a strong academic focus with pupils in Year 11 and Upper Sixth taking mock exams and looking ahead to their Easter revision before GCSE and A Level exams in the Summer. Our annual Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) Presentation Evening is always a special occasion where our Lower Sixth students present research and answer questions on their research areas, which ranged this year from Romantic Opera, the Benin Bronzes and cerebral palsy to the media, women's rights and representation, and the punk movement. Meanwhile, students have been making the most of our Encounters Series which has seen visiting speakers talk on Jane Austen, NATO, Brexit, the intelligence services and much more. Our Ruth Court Society has flourished this term with a range of fascinating talks on mathematical topics.

We have also celebrated World Book Day, British Science Week, International Women's Day and the Lunar New Year, to name but a few, whilst our CCF and Duke of Edinburgh students have been out and about on their expeditions and exercises. Our Geographers have enjoyed a fieldtrip to Cranedale and we have a group of students setting out for Costa Rica at Easter to explore the rainforests and ecosystems there.

I hope that you enjoy reading about our Spring Term at King's High and I wish you a very happy Easter.

# ROCKET CLUB LAUNCHES

Under the guidance of local expert, George Tarver, our new Rocket Club has officially taken off. A team of Lower Sixth Physics students are now working together to research, design and build the next generation of rockets, which they will test launch shortly before entering the UK Youth Rocketry Challenge (UKROC) 2024.

These are not your average school rockets – no footpumps or alkaseltzer involved – but much larger in scale, requiring a special launch site, which we have secured.

UKROC aims to engage young engineers with practical experience of executing complex missions. It's an exciting way to learn more about maths and science, and the UK winners will compete against teams from France, the USA and Japan at the International Finals at the Farnborough Airshow in July. 




# PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION




# HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY



# UNLOCKING THE FUTURE IN ENGINEERING AND TECHNOLOGY

The Manufacturing Training Centre (MTC) in Coventry was host to 30 King's students from Year 10 and Lower Sixth on 12 March. With a focus on engineering and technology at MTC, this experience was geared towards our students studying Computer Science, Design and Technology, and Innovation and Entrepreneurship. Our tour involved finding out about the kinds of work they do at MTC and included demonstrations of mini assembly lines alongside the sophisticated electronics accompanying them, coding for robotic cars and playing table football against a robot. In the case of the latter it was clear that humans were still superior in this sphere as the computer got very confused when a second ball entered the 'pitch' and so it ceased functioning!

We also had a tour of the apprenticeship training area which is vast as they take on over 500 apprentices, including degree apprentices, each year. The afternoon ended with an inspiring meeting with 'Rocket Man' who developed the company 'Gravity' which produces jet suits for individuals (see gravity.co for more information). His message was clear; 'Don't just think about your big idea, go for it, make a protype and fail fast. Then start again until you get there.' All in all, it was a great afternoon which will have planted myriad ideas in many minds.

# FROM COMBINATORICS TO CRYPTOGRAPHY



As Chair of the Ruth Court
Mathematics Society, I have
had a wonderful opportunity
to explore my interest in
mathematics and share it with
other students. This academic
year, I changed the format of
the Society by inviting speakers
to King's High to discuss topics
that expand beyond our usual
curriculum. I have been really
pleased with the response
that we have received. From

combinatorics to frieze groups, space junk to rational and irrational numbers, we have already had so many interesting talks and are looking forward to two more next term.

Mathematics is a particular passion of mine and I have really enjoyed expanding my knowledge with the other GCSE and A Level mathematics students who attend our talks. In the Summer Term, we shall have two more events after school (4.15pm-5.15pm) in the Science Lecture Theatre, both delivered by members of the faculty at Warwick University. On 22 April. Dr Edward Hill will speak on 'The use of modelling in vaccination policy decision making' and, on 29 April, Dr Siri Chongchitnan and Dr Elke Thönnes will address 'What's it like to study maths at university?'. I would really encourage students with an interest in mathematics (and biomedicine) to attend as these promise to be really interesting sessions. I'm really grateful to have been given the chance to lead the Society this year and can't wait to start organising the programme for next year.

Last year, I was very pleased to be offered a work experience placement at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory (RAL) in Oxford. I spent two weeks working with the Neutron and Muon Source group. I worked with 25 other students in Years 10-13. We began by coding functions which we later used as part of our group projects, making graphical user interfaces to be edited and used in the control rooms. My group's project involved creating a 3D waterfall graph that updated live with signals from the beam loss monitors. I faced a steep learning curve and lot of challenges with my code but it was a really rewarding experience. I learnt so much from my time there, not just in terms of academic skills, but also teamwork and presentation skills when explaining and demonstrating our work.





Recently, my supervisor published a workshop paper about beam loss and acknowledged a 'group of 26 work experience students'. To feel that I made even a very small contribution to the real work going on at RAL is amazing. I would really recommend work experience placements; they are a great way to explore career prospects. RAL offers a wide variety of options for this, including practical and theoretical science as well as computing and engineering.

This year, I also took part in the University of Southampton's 'National Cipher Challenge'. Running over 10 weeks, the challenge invited individuals and teams to solve two ciphers every Thursday. From Vigenère to trifid ciphers, I discovered many new methods of encryption and had a lot of fun trying to figure out how they work and then decrypting the messages. I even managed to apply some of the coding that I've learnt to try to create some software to help me with this. I was delighted to win a silver medal and be invited to the awards ceremony at Bletchley Park where I could explore the home of British codebreaking. It was a great event, discovering the amazing work of Alan Turing and his colleagues during World War II and later listening to the guest speakers including Marcus Du Sautoy – a Professor of Mathematics at Oxford University, and Professor Graham Niblo who runs the challenge. This competition demonstrated to me how complex and fascinating the world of cryptography is and has definitely contributed to my ambitions of pursuing a career involving mathematics and computing.


# KING'S FOOD




# KING'S INSPIRES

The majority of our students at King's enrol for Bronze level at the start of Year 10, before going on to complete Silver in Year 11 and Gold in the Sixth Form.



DofE Components include:

#### Volunteering

This is the chance to make a real difference by helping someone, your community, the environment or an organisation.

#### Expedition

The aim of this task is to encourage a spirit of adventure and discovery. Before any expedition can be carried out, the students are trained on a number of vital skills, such as first aid and emergency procedures, map and compass skills, the country code and team building.

The Bronze Expedition takes the form of a self-reliant, unaccompanied venture, working in small teams, walking a minimum distance of 24km, camping one night and cooking all meals over the two days.

The Silver and Gold Expeditions follow a similar format; however, they increase in difficulty in terms of walking distance and length of time away.

#### **Physical**

This can be any sport, dance or fitness activity. It is a chance to improve fitness, discover new abilities and experience a sense of achievement.

#### Skills

This can be anything from learning a new instrument to public speaking and debating.

#### Residential (Gold level)

This involves spending five days and four nights away from home on a shared activity with new people.

Dr Andrew Grist joined King's as Head of Chemistry in 2007 and has seen literally thousands of students through their Chemistry education, inspiring hundreds to go on to further Chemistry study and careers. To call his teaching 'inspirational' is an understatement. His unique combination of chemical expertise, humour, singing and fancy-dress will never be equalled and those lucky enough to have experienced it will never forget it. He nurtured students to get the very best from themselves and had a matchless talent for spotting exactly what support and encouragement was needed.

Dr Grist ran countless 'taster' sessions for the Year 5s, developing exciting activities and selflessly giving up his Saturdays. He was a natural showman, emerging from the mist of dry ice to audible gasps. He loved cross-curricular and project-based learning, designing many creative modules and embracing a new role as Head of Cross-Curricular Learning in 2019. Students often came to the office door with amazing models and posters, or to claim their prizes from his inventive quizzes and competitions. Lately, his fairs in the Quad, with games and tombolas, have raised hundreds of pounds for charities while simultaneously raising a smile among students and staff alike.

As a colleague, his in-depth Chemistry knowledge was invaluable. He was always ready to explain the finer points of Chemistry to anyone with a query. He loved practical work and constantly developed new methods. His packs of examination questions with quirky titles are legendary — 'Not Olly Murs but PolyMurs' and 'Al is very kene' to name just two we found on his desk.

Speaking of his desk – this has a legendary status of its own. The precipitous piles of paper always had the appearance of chaos, yet he could lay his hands on any document in moments. And from beneath the desk, marvellous outfits would appear every World Book Day, for his renowned Classics/Chemistry projects and indeed at any time when he just fancied spicing up a lesson. From Shirley Bassey to the Big Bad Wolf, you never knew who might emerge. He certainly knew how to get the students' attention.

Dr Grist's loss is devastating to the school and particularly to the Science Department. We have lost an exceptional teacher, colleague and friend. The Chem Lab will always feel like 'Andrew's lab' and we will never forget his kindness or his brilliance. We should all try to be a little bit more 'Gristy'.






#### **BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK**

The concert featured several original songs and was an incredibly special evening.

The Spring Term has also been an important one in building on our relationship with our orchestra in residence, Orchestra of the Swan. Their concert in Warwick Hall in February featured a side-by-side performance of Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite with several of our students in Foundation Symphony Orchestra. We were also joined by Orchestra of the Swan players and conductor Rebecca Miller for the second in our series of conducting workshops. All students taking part had the opportunity to conduct a professional ensemble in a performance of works by Mozart and Elgar.

The orchestra have also been working closely with our Year 7 King's students in a joint Instrumental Scheme day with students from Warwick School and The Kingsley School. Each class had the opportunity to join forces and play as part of a 60-piece orchestra; particularly impressive as they have only been learning these instruments since September! Year 7 also attended a CBSO schools' concert in February, being treated to a diverse range of exciting orchestral music.



# KING'S ART

The Inspire Art programme offers a range of far-reaching experiences and opportunities for our students who are looking to engage in all manner of creativity. Whilst also raising the profile of Art and creativity across the school community, Inspire Art aims to celebrate diversity, wellbeing, and self-expression through the visual world.

Trips and educational visits remain a vital part of the Art curriculum and this year we have enjoyed the Botanical Gardens; inspiring our Year 8 artists to look at patterns within the natural world, whilst Year 11 took inspiration from the National Gallery and recently opened National Portrait Gallery, and the Upper Sixth visited both Tate Modern and Britain after receiving their ESA. The artwork experienced in both permanent collections and ticketed exhibitions such as 'Capturing the Moment' and 'Women in Revolt' allowed the students to get a sense of their starting point and ensured a strong start to their final component of work. Key Stage 3 students attended a wonderful Inspire trip to Oxford, introducing them to the delights of the university and the wonderful collection of antiquity and artwork at the Ashmolean Museum. Such experiences are vital for artists and allow for creativity to be experienced in person, which is a magical feeling.

The Da Vinci Society is now in its fourth year and continues to flourish led by our Lower Sixth artists. This is a wonderful addition to our range of societies offered within school and ensures that creative thinkers and practitioners can come together and share ideas, specialisms, take part in workshops and debate art, its context, and its meaning.

We have also enjoyed welcoming back Old Girls who are now studying at university; their talks offered wonderful insight into Graphic Design, Foundation courses and studying Architecture at Cambridge, to name but a few. We look forward to welcoming Upper Sixth students who left last year as talks are planned for the Summer Term on their experiences at university whilst studying Fine Art at Cardiff, Foundation Art and Design at Loughborough and Interior Architecture and Design.

We also recently welcomed an Old Girl back to the school who recently graduated from UAL with a First-Class Honours degree in Fine Art. Esme provided an inspiring talk to students in all age groups, providing an insight into university life and the opportunities available whilst living and studying in central London.

Participating in Warwickshire Open Studios enables us to share our amazing facilities and artwork with so many new and regular faces. Over 400 artists and 150 venues take part in the largest celebration of creativity across the region and we look forward to seeing everyone who makes a special journey to appreciate the artwork on display in July.

Outreach continues to be an important aspect of our department and we work collaboratively with Warwick School to support the charity Kissing it Better. Friday afternoon activities focus on creating bespoke artwork for local hospitals and hospices which has such a positive impact on patients and staff alike.

At the beginning of the year, we welcomed our full time Artist in Residence, Caroline Craven, who is a specialist Glass and Silversmith artist. We have extended our facilities which now allow for lampwork glassmaking; the students are now able to watch our artist in residence create her own commissioned work incorporating Murano glass. The crossover leads to incorporating their own bespoke glass cabochons in their silver jewellery making. Students are able to create their own fused glass artwork and are now working with precious metal clay. When students want to further extend a project outside of the usual facilities, our artist in residence provides one to one tuition guiding them through more specialised techniques, materials and possibilities, resulting in spectacular outcomes.

We end the Spring Term with a much anticipated mixed-media workshop led by renowned artist lan Murphy. Ian will work with our Year 10 students for the whole day, sharing his secrets of how he manipulates surface texture using various papers and grounds. The students will create several experimental outcomes throughout the day culminating in a resolved piece inspired by lan's expressive and emotive style.

Finally, we are looking forward to our Festival of Ideas celebration at the end of the Summer Term whereby all schools within the Foundation celebrate the diversity of creativity under the theme of 'Home'. Our House structure will contain a wide variety of outcomes which celebrate the diversity of birds as we celebrate our Upper Sixth students 'flying the King's High nest' as they leave to embark upon the next exciting stage of their lives. Our 'home' will contain bird boxes, nests, and six chickens sculpted in willow to name a few of the many processes and techniques utilised to create this body of work.


























































# KING'S DRAMA

Rehearsals for The Addams Family are well underway with nearly 100 students involved onstage, backstage and as part of our junior marketing team. It promises to be a fabulously spooktacular affair in the capable hands of Ms Wyatt, Mr Albrighton, Miss Stiles and the dedicated Drama Ambassadors team.

We were honoured to host the ISA Drama Competition for a second time in the Bridge House Theatre, entertaining the other visiting schools and parents with our students' hilarious performance of the farce 'Final Dress Rehearsal'. Sixth Form Drama Scholar Taya was our co-director for this performance and students very much enjoyed her expert perspective on improvisation and energetic warm-ups!

Our Drama Scholars and Ambassadors have been very busy supporting and inspiring the younger generations of performers here at King's High School. As part of our peer mentoring programme, they have been an integral aspect of students' preparation for LAMDA exams, school productions and GCSE practical examinations. The mentees involved have all commented on the kindness, supportiveness and high skill level of the mentors that have been working hard to help them.

The Inspire Drama programme continues to grow, and we are excited to be launching a brand new after school activity in the Summer Term: Inspire Dramatists. All students that sign up will have the opportunity to work with a specialist director, working towards a rich range of exciting and challenging studio performances. In February, we invited students to watch 'My Beautiful Laundrette' at the Curve Theatre in Leicester. Based on Hanif Kureishi's iconic, Oscar-nominated screenplay, the production was set in London during the Thatcher years and followed the unexpected love story between a young British Pakistani, Omar, and a reformed member of the National Front, Jonny. We had a very enriching evening and some of the students even managed to get some pictures with the cast!

Meanwhile, our Aspiring Creatives in Theatre have been exploring digital and live Foley sound design; creating binbag pantomime dames and set painting. We have also introduced two new weekly lunchtime sessions to the Inspire Drama programme: Scriptwriting and DAC (Dramatic Arts Careers), an informative series designed to prepare students for a wide range of arts industry careers including talks and workshops from industry professionals. Next term we are looking forward to inviting professional Frantic Assembly performer Felipe Pacheco to work with several of our curriculum students, club students and scholars.

Following an enriching evening of devised performances last term, Year 11 and Upper Sixth students performed their scripted pieces to an examiner and public audiences this term; a rich and varied programme bringing a wide range of characters to life.

### LAMDA SHOWCASE

# Over 180 pupils at King's High are currently studying a range of LAMDA qualifications in Shakespeare, Verse and Prose, Acting, Reading for Performance and Speaking in Public.

LAMDA helps pupils develop practical and transferable skills, ranging from confidence, public speaking, reading, and analysing texts, through to technical skills, such as voice production. The later 'medal grades' complement and run alongside the GCSE and A Level Drama courses, both in terms of content and skills, giving additional UCAS points for university.

It has been a pleasure to see such a high standard of work being performed in our recent LAMDA examinations. Our LAMDA evening's selective programme provided an exciting insight into the diverse range of texts our full cohort have explored.

This year we saw a notable increase in the number of students choosing to perform pieces drawn from the works of such literary figures as Oscar Wilde and George Bernard Shaw. The Company's introduction to the LAMDA performances focused on a number of the themes prevalent in all of these works, such as the roles we play in society and how we may or may not be defined by our social status and family history. Through this introduction, the Company explored how the use of language and societal roles have changed since the plays were originally written.

The start of 2024 seems a very long time ago and there has been a huge amount going on in our world of sport once again this term. It has been a very busy one for the netball squads at King's with the U14 team kick starting the term by taking the ISA regional title at the Midlands round of the competition. The U13B team continued their fine run of form, defeating A teams in the SNS cup, and the U12 A team took another win in their cup campaign, defeating The FitzWimarc School from Essex in the quarter final of the Sport Magazine cup.

As the term progressed, the U15A team finished as runners up in the County tournament and the U14 team just missed out on a place at the national finals, finishing as losing semi-finalists at the regional netball finals. The U13 A team performed well at their county tournament and were crowned champions, and the U13B team also competed in the same tournament, finishing a creditable 5th place.

At the ISA national finals our U16 netball team performed well, winning all of their group games and progressing to the semi finals but were beaten at this stage and ultimately finished in 4th position. The story was very similar for our U12A team who, over the course of the past two terms, have been progressing through both the SNS National Cup and the Sports Magazine National Cup. They found themselves in national semi finals on consecutive days in the two competitions and, in a cruel twist, narrowly lost both. Finishing 4th in the country in two different competitions is something this team should still be very proud of though! There is great strength in depth within the U12 age group with the U12 B and C teams both competing in the local school tournaments and coming out as winners. The U12 B-H teams have also all recorded strong victories in their local fixtures this term.

Whilst traditionally the major competitions this term are in netball, there are a number of King's hockey teams who have been in

action. The U16 team began the term with a narrow defeat in the quarter final of their national campaign. And the U14 squad went even further, beating teams all over the country before losing in the semi final of their national campaign on sudden death penalty strokes. The U13 team were crowned county champions in the 7-a-side format of the game and we look forward to seeing how they get on in their regional final of this competition.

One thing this term has been is most certainly wet and muddy enough for cross country! Our runners have thrived once again, beginning with all 10 of the King's High runners who competed at the ISA Midlands' finals qualifying for the national finals. A remarkable achievement. This was followed up by King's High being crowned county champions in the minors and juniors age groups at the end of January, with two students being selected to compete at the national finals.

Despite waterlogged pitches all over, our football teams have been putting on some fine performances. The U14 team have been on a strong county cup run, defeating Nicholas Chamberlaine School in a penalty shoot out at the end of January before going on to win their semi-final 12-0 to set up a county cup final after the Easter break.

King's U16 rugby team took part in their first competitive fixture against King Henry VIII School this term which was a pleasure to see. This came in the same week that Year 7 pupils were able to attend a taster workshop where they were crowned team of the tournament.

There have been strong results in the pool, of particular note is the achievement of the U15 waterpolo team who have qualified for the National Final next term. We wish them the very best of luck.

# A WORD FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Warwick Schools Foundation



Enabling transformation through the power of education



Last year, we shared the Foundation's strategy for the next ten years. A key part of this was to articulate more clearly a character and personality for the charity of Warwick Schools Foundation. This included identifying areas of commonality and focus across the schools under the charity's umbrella, and areas of focus where the charity itself can helpfully take a lead.

One of the strategic intents relates to community – our current and future Foundation community, and the wider community, with the aim of developing our reputation locally and further afield.

Within our own current community, this term's Year 5 Pupil Conference, with representatives from Kingsley Prep, Warwick Prep, and Warwick Juniors, has highlighted areas where we can support our pupils' ambitions to work together. One manifestation of this is the planned orchestra day in May, bringing together the current school orchestras, to create an enhanced musical experience for all.

As a charity, we are required to demonstrate public benefit. Unhelpfully, unlike in Scotland, there is no clear definition to work towards. Broadly, educational charities such as ours consider this in two ways: first, enabling access to pupils who would not otherwise be able to attend, and educational partnerships.

We are incredibly fortunate to be supported by local charities, who help us in fulfilling this obligation. For example, we receive financial support from the Charity of Sir Thomas White and King Henry VIII Endowed Trust for means tested access for pupils who live in CV34. Income from our investments supports bursaries for those in other postcodes.

King Henry VIII also supports educational projects for pupils in the town of Warwick, including attending Holiday Action activities, and 'Sprint Finish', and we look forward to our first CV34 Music Festival next term, which brings together primary pupils through partnership work with both *Orchestra of the Swan* and *Warwick – A Singing Town*. Over the years, we have developed especially close relations with a number of our local maintained schools, and events such as this help to create even stronger bonds.


As a charity, too, all our income is reinvested in our educational provision. Use of our facilities when not required by the schools is an important and developing income strand for us, and here again we have developed strategic relationships especially in sports and the arts. This term, we hosted the finals for the National Concert Band Festival, and regional rounds of the national chamber music festival, Pro Corda. These help to cement our growing reputation as a national centre for excellence, and happily, our pupils' ensembles which performed at them were recognised for their individual expertise, too.

Our longevity is well known – our schools having delivered education in the towns of Warwick and Leamington for a combined total of 1552 years is a remarkable achievement. Building our education provision, our partnerships and further enhancing our connectivity in our community, will help ensure that our charity's future will continue to shine brightly, matching the ambitions of our forebears, whose vision has enabled countless generations to benefit from Warwick Schools Foundation.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Warwick has always been at the heart of the education provision of our schools – they are synonymous with the town and the people within it

This relationship can be traced throughout our schools' rich history. Whether we look back in time to 1545, when King Henry VIII refounded Warwick School as 'King's New Scole of Warwick'; to 1879, with the Foundation of King's High and a kindergarten that would later become Warwick Preparatory School; or to the more recent past, such as the creation of a ground-breaking partnership with Orchestra of the Swan. Warwick is the epicentre of our story.

Our pupils' experience remains intertwined with the Warwick community. In recent times, this has included Foundation pupils heading over to St. Mary's Church for the Foundation service of Thanksgiving, supporting senior residents in local care homes as part of King's High School Friday activities and Warwick Prep's 'Squirrels in the Community', and, as recently as last month, Warwick School Buglers performing at the 80th anniversary commemoration service of the sinking of HMS Warwick.

Of course, our relationship with Warwick also extends into the wider county – most notably, with the welcoming of The Kingsley School into the Warwick Schools Foundation family in 2021, or through the various community outreach opportunities that we are honoured to provide. We are proud to have Warwick and the surrounding areas at the very heart of our history.
